Pastor's Reflections

Beloveds in Christ,

This morning, in my reading, I came upon Woody Guthrie's new year's resolutions from 1943.¹ Guthrie, a talented and prolific musician who struggled with chronic illness and often had a troubled home-life, wrote these resolutions during World War II (one of his resolutions was to "Help win war- beat fascism"). His list of 33 resolutions is a poignant reflection of what was meaningful to him at that particular moment in his life. Some of the resolutions seem simple: reminders to brush his teeth, take a bath, and eat some fruit and vegetables. Others seem like good advice for professional improvement: develop a schedule to help work more and better, read more, listen to the radio more, "play and sing good." Knowing that he and his first wife would divorce later in the same year, I read his resolutions to "send Mary and the kids money" and "don't get lonesome" with some sadness. At the same time, though, he resolved to "keep hoping machine running," to dance better, and to "wake up and fight." It turns out that Guthrie is a lot like the rest of us, living a life of joy and pain, dedication and complacency, connection and isolation, dancing and forgetting to brush your teeth.

Soon (very soon), we will begin again, starting the centuries-old journey through the church year. In just a few weeks from my writing of this note, Advent will return, reminding us of God's radical breaking into the world in the form of a poor Jewish refugee child. We will be invited, once again, to re-imagine how we can help God break into the world anew through our acts of worship and service.

Good news! We are in a good financial position as of October. YTD Total Income is ahead of projections by \$3,276 due to a variety of reasons including some prepaid pledges, strong fundraising, etc. Everyone is doing an excellent job in controlling expenses. YTD Total Expenses are below budget by \$3,551 in large part due to the warm weather throughout the year as our fuel bills continue to remain substantially below budget. It will be important to meet or surpass our income projections and manage our expenses throughout the remainder of the year. Thank you everyone for everything you do to financially support the Church so we can continue all the great work we've been doing in serving our community and supporting our missions.

Hannaford Gift Card Sales



For nearly six years now, this ongoing fundraiser continues to average \$2,400 a year in income for our church. With a Hannaford store in our village and many throughout the area, using a gift card for weekly grocery needs or gifting to a family member is an easy way to shop. It is also a good way to

budget, having a specific amount set aside for food. When a card is purchased through the church, 5% is earned in return from the company.

Card orders take some planning as they now are done on line. A minimum of \$1,000 purchase must be made as a bulk order for fundraising purposes and processing and shipping can take up to 9 days. A \$2,000 order is typically placed as those cards will sell in 2-3 weeks. Cards sales are on Sunday right after church in Fellowship Hall during hospitality time or you can get them during the week by contacting me through email ellingwood@roadrunner.com or 377-6890.

The money from this fundraiser is part of the planned annual budgeted income for our church like all the other monthly and annual fundraisers we hold. If you would like to help out with the church's finances, consider using a gift card when shopping.

Capital Campaign Case

"...for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples." From Isaiah 56:7

The Winthrop Congregational Church UCC has voted to undertake a capital campaign to fund projects which will maintain and upgrade the church building. This vote was a powerful step of faith in our congregation and is a great testament to our commitment to helping this church continue to serve God and neighbor. We have shown, once again, that we are excited about our ministry together and potential for God to show us new and different ways to utilize this building as a tool for ministry.

Our church's mission is to be a Christ-centered community of prayer and worship, of welcome and care, of learning and growing, of witness and service in the worldwide church of Jesus Christ. We are called to find new, creative ways to live out this mission. Our building can be one of our most significant tools for ministry, particularly as the place where we most often worship together and as a space to practice Christian hospitality and welcome.

The Winthrop Congregational Church is an Open and Affirming faith community. The Church building serves as the center of worship for the church membership, as well as the center for services provided to the community by the church membership. The Church building serves as a safe and convenient meeting place and as a place for special functions for other

community organizations, including Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) and The Rotary Hunters' breakfasts.

In order to continue to serve as part the mission of the congregation as a place



of rich worship and deep welcome, we must assure that our building is both structurally sound and welcoming to all who enter. The repairs and upgrades we are proposing are important to our Congregation, and also to groups that use the church building as a meeting place. They are important to the community at large as the church building is a very visible and historic structure on the Main Street

of our town.

The projects to be funded by the campaign include repair of the church roof, repair of the bell tower, repair of the sanctuary ceiling, painting of the front entry and new flooring for the front entry. Each of these is described in more detail below.

- The church roof shingles on the Main Street side have been loosening and blowing off. This has resulted in roof leaks and some damage to the sanctuary ceiling. We have been replacing sections of shingles as they blow off. For a more permanent repair, we plan to remove the shingles, install plywood and install new shingles.
- The bell tower has been leaking during heavy wind driven rains resulting in some water damage in the sanctuary. We plan to install new weather proofing to the bell tower to eliminate water intrusion.
- Once we have eliminated sources of rain water intrusion through the roof and bell tower, we plan to repair the water damage to the Sanctuary ceiling.
- The wall paper, paint and carpet in the main entry way of the church are worn and need replacing. We plan to paint the walls and ceiling and replace the carpet.
- The repair of the roof and bell tower is necessary to repair deterioration which has occurred over time to the church structure and to prevent further damage due to water intrusion. The upgrading of the entry way improve the first impression that the church building makes on members and visitors.

The capital campaign will be initiated in January, 2017. We will be asking for pledges to be paid over a period of three years. We plan to undertake the repairs and upgrades on a priority basis as funds from the capital campaign become available. We plan to keep the congregation informed of the progress of the campaign and to seek concurrence as we develop specific plans for repairs and upgrades.

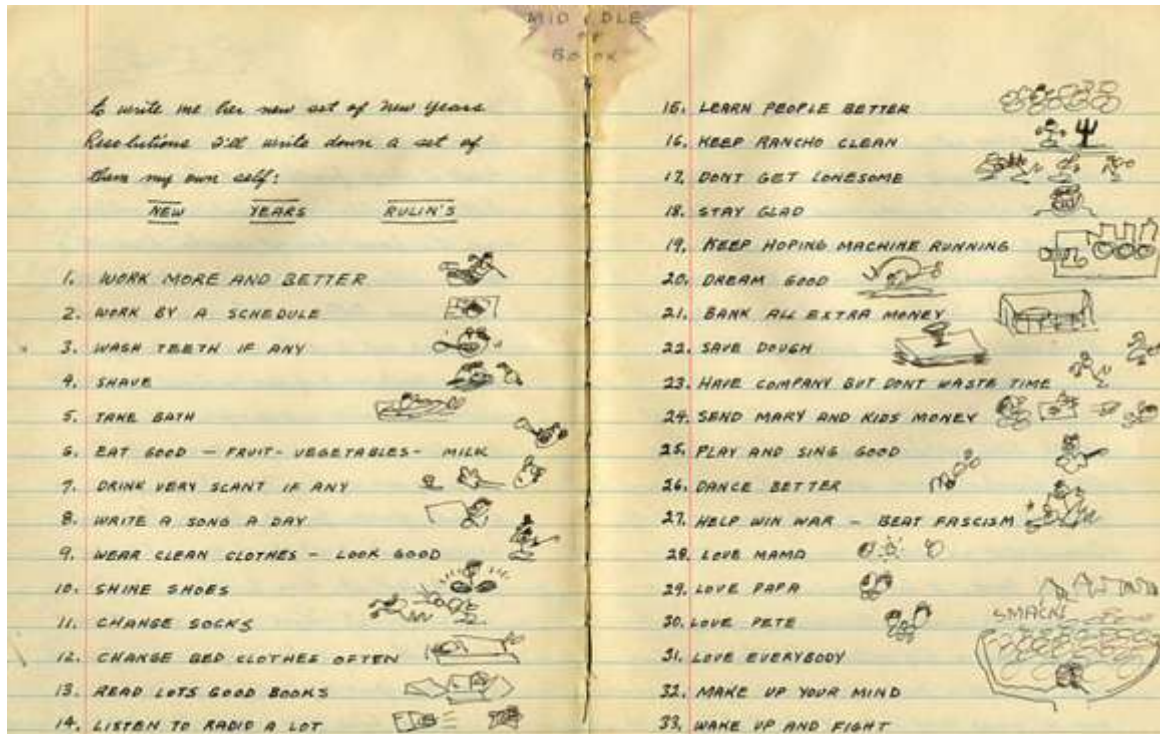

On January 1, 1943, the American folk music legend Woody Guthrie jotted in his journal a list of 33 “New Years Rulin’s.” Nowadays, we’d call them New Year’s Resolutions. Adorned by doodles, the list is down to earth by any measure. Family, song, taking a political stand, personal hygiene — they’re the values or aspirations that top his list.




Below, we have provided a transcript of Guthrie’s Rulin’s.

5. Take bath
6. Eat good — fruit — vegetables — milk
7. Drink very scant if any
8. Write a song a day
