


Pastor's Reflections

I feel like such a crank this time of year. It usually starts in early October when green and red elves and shiny bows begin to appear in the aisles at the grocery store and the pharmacy. I sigh and say, "It's not even Halloween yet!" It gets worse as the fall progresses. As we enter November, the more I watch television and go to stores, the more green and red I see. Toy commercials have begun to play in heavy rotation, tempting children with expensive pieces of molded plastic.

Electronics commercials begin to amp up their rotation, too, tempting adults with even more expensive pieces of molded plastic. Suddenly I notice snowflakes decorating windows and Christmas carols sneaking into the music on the radio during my morning commute. As I flip channels, I notice that one cable channel has started showing their Christmas movies on Friday and Saturday nights. With great

trepidation, I look at the calendar to confirm what I've suspected. It isn't even Thanksgiving yet and the onslaught has begun. Christmas cheer, in the form of ecstatic commercialism, has begun to invade all of my space. And, I can't stand it! Now, this is the point in the letter where the preacher realizes that she probably alienated a significant portion of the readership by appearing to be anti-



Christmas or excessively Scrooge-y. If so, I do apologize. You see, it's not that I don't like Christmas. That is not the case at all. What I don't like is all the consumerism wrapped up in faux sentimentality that gets labeled as "Christmas" in the broader culture. Christmas should be about Emmanuel...God with us. It is not about whatever over-priced, poorly-constructed, heavily marketed piece of plastic that some corporation tells us will make us happy. Christmas is a reminder of God's deep love

enfleshed, living, serving, and hurting in the world with us. I want more for Christmas than stuff and debt and trash and shame for not being able to purchase what the world says I need. Christmas means more, and we need something deeper than the pile of receipts we collect to find meaning and light in the midst of the bleak mid-winter.

I regain some of that meaning when I think less about presents to buy and think more about the presence of God. Advent is the church season leading up to Christmas. Rather than ramping up my anxiety by telling me that I have a lot to

buy and very few days in which to buy it, Advent reminds me of the value of waiting in expectation for the in-breaking of God. Advent reminds me that I am a beloved child of God, regardless of what I own or what I can afford to buy. Advent reminds me of my call to do justice and love mercy. As we worship together on these four Sundays, we hope to evoke the emotions of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love, rather than Greed, Jealousy, and Shame that seem so much at the core of the consumerist drive. Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love seem much more like Christmas to me than any big screen TV or diamond necklace.

So, this season, don't get swept up in the onslaught. Celebrate Thanksgiving as a time to actually give thanks. Be kind to everyone, especially people working in retail during this harried time of year. Build relationships, not debt.

Come worship with us. Spend some time in the mystery of God. You will have a great return on your investment.

From the Trustees

Our Sanctuary project is in full swing. The ceiling and walls have been painted for less than we anticipated last winter. That savings allowed for the floor to be refinished. The floor was just completed and we are ready to move the piano back and re-install the pews. The chancel, the raised platform at the front of the church,



needs work to strengthen one area. A total of \$13,000 was originally available in memorial and designated gifts for the project. To date about \$9,000 has been spent. The sanctuary committee would like to move forward and complete the project by carpeting the chancel, and installing carpet as runners across the back of the sanctuary and down each aisle. This results in carpeting in the high traffic areas but

allows us to see the beautiful Douglas fir floor. Carpet options and estimated costs are being solicited now to see how much it will cost in anticipation of asking the congregation about finishing the project.

From the Treasurer

The financial picture at the end of October was good. At the end of the October, total income was \$951 more than budgeted. This surplus was largely due to Total Offerings which were \$1,271 more than budget. At the end of October, total expenses were \$4,838 less than budget. Overall, at the end of October, our expenses had exceeded our income by just \$209. This compares very favorably to the end of last October (2013) when our expenses exceeded our income by \$6,261.

For the most part our budget for this year was quite realistic with respect to income projections for the year and the expense reductions done to balance the budget.

Prayers and food for our friends in Roatán, Honduras

The Honduras mission team is saddened and shocked to learn of the October 23rd shooting death of Domingo Caballero, one of the members of the church in Roatán, Honduras. Our Honduran friends' "hearts are filled with grief" as they write to ask for our church's continuing prayers. We met Domingo and his family earlier this year on our second trip to Roatán led by Rev. Alice Anderman. The family was new to the La Vida Nueva Church in Roatán, having come from a different church elsewhere, and they were very happy with their new church and the opportunities to serve God. When the first



information that we received about Domingo's death included an error in his wife's name, we were not entirely certain who had been killed.

Further correspondence with one of our dear friends in Roatán has clarified things for us. The father, Domingo, and his wife, Ania, and their new baby Celeste, were a noticeable trio when we were in Honduras last May. They have three other children: Jeremias, 8, Elizabeth 10, and Mario, 14. The family attended several church services while we were there, and they were part of the church group that we accompanied to the beach on Sunday afternoon. The parents and baby spent most of that time in the picnic area sheltered from the sun, while their older children played in the warm ocean water with other children and adults. On our last night there, Elizabeth approached me and gave me a hug and put a plastic bracelet on my wrist. She seemed a little shy with us, and sweet, like her mother Ania.

What will happen to this family now – one young mother and four children? The church people in Roatán are caring and generous (like our church) and they will help, but they are poor in material resources. How will the older children be affected by their father's violent death? He was shot in his car as he left their home one morning for work. Why? We don't know why.

Our church can continue to pray for Domingo's family and for La Vida Nueva church in Roatán, Honduras. They have already thanked us for the prayers we offered last Sunday in church and sent in email. Our friend Esli wrote "God bless all the brothers and sisters there. We love them very much. I give you greetings for them." She has asked us to keep praying for her church – why would we not? They are looking to God and to their brothers and sisters in Christ to ease the burden. The mission team will let them know of our continuing prayers.

Our church can also send a donation to help the family buy food. I know we cannot financially support everyone in need in Honduras or at home, but this, this is so heartbreakingly tragic - we would like to reach out. Pastor Otilio at La Vida Nueva reports that the priority for helping the family is food. \$8 a day is the estimated cost to feed the family. Let's see how many days' help we can give. Contributions can be given to Wendy Dennis or Cyndi Hall; checks should be made out to Winthrop Congregational Church. Any amount, cash or check, greatly appreciated. Wendy Dennis, on behalf of the Honduras Mission Team (Winthrop unit) - Alice Anderman, Debbie Burns, Cyndi & Dana Hall, Linda Ruman, Lisa deWolfe – and with Rev. Chrissy's blessing.






