We'll also collect donations for the family violence shelter and continue to collect goods for the local food pantry in Winthrop and the everyday essentials pantry in Augusta.



Fish Chowder Luncheons

As we enter the fall season, we start to think about cool weather meals. At WCC, we start planning for our monthly chowder luncheons that are held on the second Friday of each month (except December) and run through May. Our next luncheon is on September 9th.

Fish is ordered and the rest of the chowder ingredients are supplied by members of the church. Items like crackers, pickles, punch and coffee are also solicited. Others willingly bake pies and biscuits for every luncheon, but if there are enough bakers, then someone will have a month off. There are always miscellaneous items needed such as paper supplies, take-out containers, foil, food wrappers, etc., that are donated. Any monetary donations are used to pay for the fish. Besides all that members donate, many put in a portion of a day working during the luncheon. The chowder cooks, take-out person, waiters, cashier, pie server, delivery person and the dishwasher all help in making it happen for this fund raiser.

We welcome anyone who would like to fill in as a food provider, baker or work at the luncheon. Unless it is a sell out, we all sit together and enjoy a full chowder luncheon after serving is over. We never mind just biscuits and pie if the pot is empty. It means a successful day!

Worship Services at Mount Titcomb

Last year, the Franklin Association made an intentional decision to worship together as an association once a year. They had their first joint service last September (Cyndi Hall, Marie Pettengill, and Deb Blood all went). The next joint service is on September 18th. Given that the Franklin Association and Kennebec Valley Association have been discerning how we might become one larger Association, all of the Kennebec Valley Association churches have been invited to attend this year. I have also been invited to preach that morning. In conversation with our church council and after hearing how deeply moving last year's service was, we are inviting our whole church to come to Titcomb Mountain for worship this year. The service will be during our regular worship time. We can carpool together to worship. If you would be willing to drive people to Titcomb Mountain, would you email me (pastorchrissywcc@gmail.com)? I am very excited about potential for this rich worship service. I hope that you will come.

Here is the description from Alexis Fuller-Wright, the pastor at Old South in Farmington:

"The Franklin Association made an intentional decision to worship together once a year - a tradition we hope to share with Kennebec if the Spirit moves us to share in ministry together moving forward - because nothing strengthens a body of people like worshiping and praying together. We hoped it would be good - we weren't prepared for how deeply it would knit us together and move us into a place of hope. First of all, worshiping outside was a complete joy and delight. What is more sacred than God's great cathedral? But beyond that it was a true celebration of all of our gifts...an affirmation that each of our communities, large and small, have a unique call to mend the world. It was really freeing to do worship a different way, and to spend time celebrating the abundance of our gifts. It was super fun to have so many people join the pick-up choir of Give Me That Old Time Religion. Probably half of the people gathered got up to sing the anthem. It was also incredibly sacred to take communion together, remembering that we share a common cup and a sacred promise. It's hard to describe, but something about that worship was greater than the sum of its parts. I guess that's just what happens when the Spirit is so present. I believe 1-2 people from your congregation were present last time and I wonder what has stayed with them about that day."

Former WCC Pastor Celebrates 50 years of Ordination

Bill Hamel was born and raised in the Boston area and graduated from Reading High School in June of 1950. The following fall, he entered Northeastern University. He transferred to Burdett College in the fall of 1951 and graduated in June 1953 with highest honors. Following graduation he was employed by John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company and worked in a supervisory capacity for the next seven years. In April 1959 he decided to enter training for the Ordained Christian Ministry. Bill applied and was accepted by Bangor Theological Seminary, where he would enter as a special student in September of 1960.

During seminary, Bill worked part-time. He and Pat married in June of 1961. Most of the seminary students served as supply ministers at area churches, as did Bill. The church in Dedham, ME needed a part-time pastor and kept asking him to return as a supply minister until he finally agreed to serve there as their part-time student pastor. Bill served there for two years. They had a son Bill Jr. during this time. After completing his studies at Bangor Theological Seminary, Bill began studies for his Bachelor's degree at Bowdoin College (on a full 2 yr scholarship- George Warren Field award).

Bill accepted a call at the Winthrop Congregational Church in 1963 as a student pastor to be closer to college classes in Brunswick. He served at the Winthrop church from December 22, 1963 – February 28, 1965, during the time when the church was exploring becoming part of the United Church of Christ. In 1958, the church had decided

not to become part of the United Church of Christ. Bill's convictions about the United Church of Christ started a discernment period that led to our Church joining the UCC in 1967. Bill's connection to the Maine Conference UCC brought him from Winthrop to the Stevens Avenue Congregational Church in Portland, ME. They had their second son Jon Christopher during this time.

Bill was ordained in the United Church of Christ on June 26, 1966. He served as a full time ordained minister at churches in Greenville/Rockwood ME, in Goffstown, NH; in West Seneca, NY; in Austinburg, OH; in Greenland, NH; and in Seymour, CT. Bill was the Senior Pastor at the Seymour church for 9 years. During this time, the church added 208 members. The team of Bill as Senior Pastor, Pat as Minister of Christian Education and Cherie as Minister of Music, helped the church grow in membership. The Christian Education program grew from 12 children to 128 with 31 members volunteering to teach church school or the youth groups or taking charge of the nursery. The choir grew from one regular choir to four choirs including carol choir, junior choir, junior highs were invited to sing with the senior choir, and the sometime singer's choir.

After his retirement, Bill continued to serve as interim minister and supply pastor for various churches until 2011. In New Hampshire Bill served two churches as interim minister. He served as Interim Pastor for First Christian Church, the Disciples of Christ at Winter Haven, FL and supplied for three Presbyterian churches near where they lived in Florida.


He and his wife Pat live in Kennewick, Washington to be close to their son Bill Jr. They have been married 55 years. Their oldest son Bill, Jr. was a baby when they lived in Winthrop. He is now working for the Department of Energy. Their second son Jon Christopher died in 1998.

On June 26th of this year, Bill celebrated 50 years of ordination. Family, friends, and members from his past churches sent congratulations cards (at least 70 of them!). Bill received cards and notes from Winthrop church friends as well.

The Minister and the Elders of Kennewick Christian Church Disciples of Christ requested that Bill receive a pin "Honored Pastor" which is a special pin given for years of service to retired ministers only after a request from a pastor and the elders of a church who know a retired pastor and his service to the church and denominations. They had the laying on of hands and prayers in the same manner as during an ordination service.

Pat has written a book titled, "God Loves You, We Love You" about their life in the
