MAINE CONFERENCE UCC 78th ANNUAL MEETING

Rev. Karen, Marie P., and Dina will be

attending the Maine Conference UCC annual meeting at Sunday River on 9/25 – 9/27/09. The title of this year's meeting is "Hold Fast to Love and Justice." Here's an excerpt from the Conference website: Our churches here in Maine are faced with a multitude of social issues that challenge individuals, communities, our nation, and the world - an escalating economic crisis, growing numbers of people without health care, how to respond to our immigrant population, and marriage equality - to name just a few. These issues present our challenges churches with both opportunities. Our Annual Meeting's theme of justice – from worship and workshops to our speakers and presenters - will undoubtedly remind us and inspire us to faithful responses - that love is at the very heart of the gospel and justice is the life We gather to celebrate the blood. ministries of our churches and seek new ways to "hold fast to love and justice." The workshops they will be attending are described below.

The Marriage Equality Debate - This workshop will take a look at the current debate about Marriage Equality in Maine. We will look at the bill as it is written, the issues raised in the debate, and the theologies that surround them the various points of view. (Marie P.)

Worship and Just Living: The Intimate Connection - We will practice and explore worship as a communal spiritual discipline of just living, a counter-cultural event that builds outward-looking communities of justice and love. (Rev. Karen and Dina)

ONA: Open and Affirming! Just what does that mean??? - Have you ever thought: What does it mean to be an ONA Church? Where are the ONA churches in Maine? What have churches in Maine that have become ONA experienced? Or, have you thought: How do we become an ONA Church? What would it mean for our church to become an ONA Church? We will discuss these questions in an open and honest dialogue. We will explore some of the experiences of ONA (Open and Affirming) Churches in Maine. (Rev. Karen and Dina)

Faith Community Response Domestic Violence - This workshop will increase awareness of domestic violence. offer strategies for response and prevention, and increase knowledge of community resources. Religious and theological concerns of victims/survivors and their questions about suffering, power, forgiveness, reconciliation, and hope will be addressed. (Marie P.)
