

Pastor's Reflections

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? ~ Proverbs 8:1

Given this week's snow storm in Northern Maine, I am almost afraid to say it out loud. I'm trying to be both brave and hopeful, so I will at least write the following words: I think spring is here to stay. Summer will soon be here in earnest. As I write these words, I am giving thanks for a beautiful blue-sky day and the bees that are beginning to circle the daffodils and dandelions in our yard. I'm even trying to be grateful for the black flies and deer ticks, because if they are back, it really must be Spring. In this Sabbath season, where much of our church is looking forward taking some rest and slowing down, I know that you will be looking for good books to read as you sit in the warm, summer sun. Here are a couple good ones:

- *Openings: A Daybook of Saints, Psalms, and Prayer* by Larry James Peacockthis is a lovely daily devotional with rich, creative, full-bodied prayers
- Let Your Life Speak: Listening for the Voice of Vocation by Parker J. Palmer- a short meditation on finding one's true calling
- *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life* by Karen Armstrong- Armstrong shares concrete methods to help cultivate and expand our capacity for compassion
- *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion* by Gregory Boyle- inspired by 20 years of work in impoverished parts of LA, the essays invite us to imagine how full our lives could be if people could find the joy in loving and in being loved
- *Between the World and Me* by Ta-Nehisi Coates- written in the form of a letter to his son, Coates shares the story of his understanding of his place in the world by exploring several important experiences in his life
- *Searching for Sunday: Loving, Leaving, and Finding the Church* by Rachel Held Evans- a spiritual memoir about her evolving faith
- *Children of God Storybook Bible* by Desmond Tutu- developmentally appropriate versions of many Bible stories accompanied by rich and diverse artwork
- *Not Alone: Reflections on Faith and Depression* by Monica A. Coleman- Writing as a minister and someone who lives with depression, Coleman has created a 40-day devotional tool that embraces personal exploration and experiences of strength, hope, love and spirit.

I hope your spring and summer are fruitful. I know that God's wisdom will rest with you whether you are at church or traveling or at your own home. I pray that you can cultivate Wisdom just as easily as you plant you summer garden. Pastor Chrissy

On Fathers' Day we will be taking up a special collection for Pilgrim Lodge, our Maine Conference Church Camp, to support the



Fish Chowder Luncheons

Our monthly chowder luncheons ended in May for a summer break and will resume in September. Sales have been great through the winter and early spring months with over 60 meals, on average, being sold and selling out of two pots of chowder. When there is enough fish on hand, earnings are close to \$600. A box of 40 pounds of haddock costs \$126. It takes 30 pounds for two pots of chowder so every 4th month there is no expense for fish. A lot more goes into the preparation of the meal served that mostly the same members are generously providing each month: potatoes, onions, butter, milk, pickles, biscuits and homemade pies. Thank you to all those that continue to support this forever fundraiser through: monetary donations for supplies, chowder ingredients, baking, the chowder maker, servers and the dishwashers. Historical Records Committee

After making an inventory of the church's historical records, the Historical Records Committee was ready to start scanning the documents.



In January, Marie Hatfield and I attended a very timely workshop about digitizing records. The speaker was Adam Fisher who is the Director of Collections at the Maine State Library (MSL). He encouraged workshop participants to utilize the resources at the MSL, such as their high resolution book scanner.

We arranged our first trip to the MSL on March 18th. Seven of us (Marie Hatfield, Ann Mitchell, Sandra Smith, Ginger & Hariph Smith, Dana, and I) were trained to use the various scanner/reader machines. Adam then uploaded the scans to the MSL Repository,


which is accessible on the library's "Digitize Maine" site.

A smaller group (Ann Mitchell, Sandra Smith, Dana Hall & I) returned to the MSL on Mar 25th, Apr 1st, Apr 29th and May 16th to continue scanning documents. We have completed four large ledger books, one church manual, and all of the deeds and Annual Report booklets. The group has been busy and Adam has been extremely helpful with the process.
